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MESSAGE FROM THE FOUNDATION

With great pleasure and pride, in December of 2019 we commemorated the first 40 years of Fundación Banco Popular. We celebrated four decades of service to Puerto Rico, a result of the dream we were able to transform into a reality in 1979.

Since then, we have come very far; we have learned and evolved. We have developed relationships, based on mutual respect and trust, with the organizations that we work with. We have focused our resources and established evaluation mechanisms to ensure the effectiveness of our investment. We have made Popular employees a key part of our work. We have developed programs to support leaders of the non-profit sector and help them strengthen administrative skills to ensure the sustainability of their organizations. We have encouraged partnerships and the sharing of learnings and ideas. We institutionalized the value of collaboration through the creation of the Community of Collaboration and Social Innovation (CCIS by its Spanish acronym) within the Foundation's headquarters and have developed proprietary programs to launch innovative models.

The experience gained and the relationships cultivated throughout the decades have allowed us to respond swiftly and effectively in the most critical times, such as in hurricanes Irma and María in 2017, the earthquakes in early 2020 and the current

COVID-19 pandemic. During this unprecedented situation, as in previous occasions, we have been working closely with the organizations that we support to ensure the continuity of their services. In particular, we have offered emergency grants, provided technological resources to enable the organizations we work with to operate virtually and supported vulnerable populations, such as the homeless. Natural disasters and situations like the one we are currently facing expose and, unfortunately, exacerbate social differences. As an organization dedicated to improving the quality of life in Puerto Rico, we reiterate our commitment to work with our partners to address the challenges that we face today and in the future.

Our achievements make us proud and, more importantly, motivate us as we move forward. The next 40 years will require new ways of thinking, acting and working towards the Puerto Rico that we desire: prosperous and dignified for all, where access to educational opportunities and a spirit of self-sufficiency promote excellence, ethics and civility.

We thank our partner organizations, fellow foundations, donors and volunteers for being a fundamental part of our journey. We will continue to work, together with you, with the level of commitment that has driven us until now.

We have been serving Puerto Rico for forty years, fulfilling the vision of our founder, Rafael Carrión, Jr., "Don Papi": real growth, rooted in communities and driven by its members.

We were initially incorporated as Fundación B.P.P.R, Inc. on December 21, 1979, but the dream was born long before. The initial injection of \$500,000 was a result of an excess reserve from a complicated transaction in which Popular acquired part of Banco Crédito y Ahorro Ponceño. Don Papi believed that a philanthropic structure was needed to channel Popular's social engagement.

The legacy of Don Papi's dream transcends the financing of programs, the economic figures and the number of people impacted. The Foundation's legacy is to highlight the rich knowledge within Puerto Rican communities regarding problem solving and overcoming adversity.

On this anniversary, we reaffirm our goal of amplifying their voices and honoring the experiences of communities most affected by inequality. The historic \$50 million investment in more than 300 organizations that impact tens of thousands of children, youths and adults that deserve a more compassionate and prosperous country is a shared achievement. The respect we feel for our partners and genuine admiration for their unfaltering commitment is our reason for being.



DEVELOPMENT OF MUSICAL TALENT

REVIVE LA MÚSICA

In partnership with Fundación Luis A. Ferré, we promote musical education through the collection of used instruments that are then refurbished and donated to music programs in public schools and nonprofit organizations.

As a part of the program, since 2009 we celebrate an annual concert in which students perform alongside great musical interpreters who donate their time and talent. This activity constitutes, in most cases, the first experience that the students have performing on stage with a musical professional.

ACELERACIÓN MUSICAL

We promote the development of musically talented young adults though a unique learning experience that allows them to continue advancing in the musical field, as professionals and entrepreneurs. Launched in 2018, the program consists of workshops during a week-long summer internship, during which participants learn music techniques, Puerto Rican music history and entrepreneurship in the music world.

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COLLABORATION AND SOCIAL INNOVATION



COMMUNITY OF COLLABORATION AND SOCIAL INNOVATION

In 2014, our commitment to social innovation inspired the construction of the Community of Collaboration and Social Innovation (CCIS by its Spanish acronym) within the premises of Fundación Banco Popular. The CCIS, the first collaborative workspace for nonprofit organizations in Puerto Rico, provides spaces for interaction and exchange of ideas, questions, and solutions among different sectors.

PUERTO RICO BIG IDEAS CHALLENGE

With the funds raised to help victims of Hurricane María, we launched, together with the Hispanic Federation, the Puerto Rico Big Ideas Challenge: the first social innovation competition in Puerto Rico to promote bold proposals for community transformation.

2018

After receiving and evaluating 78 proposals, five semifinalists received \$25,000, each, and one project received a special prize of \$100,000. In addition, three finalists were selected to receive an initial prize of \$150,000, each, to conduct a sixmonth-long pilot and compete for the final first, second, and third place prizes.

2019 SOLVE AT MIT

Representatives from each of the three teams traveled to Cambridge, Massachusetts to attend the Solve at MIT 2019 Conference, an initiative of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) where social innovators from around the world present their solutions to global challenges and compete for prizes to implement them. As an ally to the Puerto Rico Big Ideas Challenge since 2018, Solve completed an exhaustive evaluation of the needs for each project, offered individual counseling and established connections with professors from MIT in the different focus areas. During the conference, the winners participated in workshops where they shared experiences and presented their grand idea to more than 50 social innovators and investors.









FIRST PLACE:

CARAS CON CAUSA \$450K



Development of a community-led field research laboratory dedicated to environmental sciences as a part of a wider sustainable community development strategy to address the issues of air, ground and water pollution, as well as flooding, that affect communities in Guaynabo and Cataño. Among the principal objectives of the laboratory is to improve of the academic resources offered to students in the area by involving them in conservation activities in the Reserve and to serve as a base for scientific investigation for local and other universities in the Ciénaga las Cucharillas Natural Reserve (RNCC by its Spanish acronym). The laboratory will serve as a potential source of employment and income by allowing the organization to submit investigation proposals to entities such as the National Science Foundation.

Installation of biodigesters in three communities in Vieques, Guánica, and Yauco in areas that are not connected to the central sanitary sewage system. The biodigesters work as an environmental solution to contaminants caused by the lack of connection. They also serve to reduce the emission of greenhouse gases, generate renewable energy, help reduce contamination from livestock facilities and creates byproducts such as organic fertilizers that can be used for the production of food.

"The anaerobic biodigester is a closed chamber, without oxygen, that feeds off biomass – fecal excrements and food waste, among others. There, the bacteria degrade the mass and produce clean energy, by way of biogas, and organic fertilizers for agriculture."

Development of the Center for Agricultural Security and Sustainability focused on knowledge transfer through the supply of materials for the micropropagation of agricultural crops with commercial value. They include training and support for farmers and other agribusiness sectors in areas such as management, economic sustainability practices, agriculture in controlled environments and the added value of agricultural products. Long-term goals include an improvement in the socioeconomic profile of the rural mountainous region, a reduction in the problem of food security and a better conservation of natural resources.

FOMENTANDO ALIANZAS

In 2012, we set out to promote and form partnerships with our Social Investment Program grantees to share best practices and collaborate on social innovation projects. Fomentando Alianzas (Promoting Partnerships) convenes, connects, and supports organizations while fostering the ideal conditions to establish efficient collaboration networks based on common interests and challenges.

INTERNATIONAL CHILDHOOD RIGHTS

The organizations that compose the After-School Programs Partnership worked together to create a guide for teaching the International Rights of the Child as adopted at the United Nations' Convention on the Rights of the Child (1989). The guide was digitalized for educational purposes and is available for free download at www.derechosdelaninez.org

On November 20, we celebrated the United Nation's World Children's Day by inviting 85 children and their caregivers to an afternoon of reading and recreational activities in partnership with Centro Inés, Revista Étnica, Mentes Puertorriqueñas en Acción, La Red por los Derechos de la Niñez y la Juventud de Puerto Rico, Editorial Destellos and Aparicio Distributors.

EMPLOYABILITY FOR THE FUNCTIONAL DIVERSE

In collaboration with the Asociación Mayaguezana de Personas con Impedimentos (AMPI), el Colegio de Educación Especial y Rehabilitación Integral and Centro de Ayuda y Terapia al Niño con Impedimento (AYANI), members of the Special Education Partnership, we created profiles inspired on reallife young adults with employability potential to be used as tools at the Design Sprint training, offered by Seriously Creative. Eleven teams brainstormed throughout the day-and-a-half training session and presented their proposals to improve access to labor opportunities to partner organizations.













CASA DE NIÑOS POPULAR

Casa de Niños Popular is a preschool center based on the Montessori teaching method, which serves children of Popular employees and children from neighboring communities between the ages of three and six. Inaugurated in August of 2016, it is a private not-for-profit organization managed and supported by the Foundation.

Its principal objective is to develop an innovative model based on Montessori educational excellence that promotes multisectoral collaboration and can be adapted by other communities. The model pursues excellence, the dignified compensation of its personnel and the integration of children from different social strata.

DISASTER RELIEF

PUERTO RICO EMBRACES THE BAHAMAS

Following the strike of Hurricane Dorian, which devastated the Bahamas, we led a fundraising campaign to provide immediate aid.

We launched the fund with donations of \$100,000 from Popular and \$50,000 from EVERTEC and raised a total of \$291,000.

The funds were distributed among seven international and local organizations working on recovery efforts.


